- “21 So the king sent Jehudi to bring the scroll, and he took it from Elishama the scribe’s chamber. And Jehudi read it in the hearing of the king and in the hearing of all the princes who stood beside the king. 22 Now the king was sitting in the winter house in the ninth month, with *a fire* burning on the hearth before him.


Jeremiah 36:21-30







- **Martyrdom of Apostles**

- 5) Philip – crucified

- 6) Bartholomew – flayed and crucified upside down

- 7) James the lesser – thrown from a high point, stoned and beaten to death

11) **Thomas – run through with a spear**


12) **Matthias – crucified**


- Diocletian – Emperor (284-305)
 - Sought to destroy texts of the Bible:
 - “In AD 303 Diocletian issued edicts for the active persecution of Christians. Scriptures were confiscated and burned. Prisons became so crowded with Christians that there was no room for criminals, so Christians were exiled, stripped of property, killed by the sword or wild beasts, or sent to labor camps where they were worked to death”
(Halley’s Bible Handbook, p. 980)

The Winds of Change



- Persecution temporarily stopped with the rise of Constantine as emperor in Rome (313 AD)
 - “The man who had been persecuting Christians since “that” persecution (1 John 2:7-8) manifest himself to him as a Roman (1 John 2:7-8)

The church became a *political* institution with Rome for the headquarters


In 607 AD Boniface III, elected the first pope

Boundary representation is not necessarily authoritative.

Jerome



- **386 AD** – Translated the Bible into Latin
 - Latin Vulgate (“Vulgar” meaning “common tongue”)
 - Jerome wanted the Bible accessible
 - Others would come to see Latin as the “language of God” and call it heresy to use other languages.



Other Translations



- By **500 AD** the Bible was available in many languages
 - In **600 AD**, Catholic leadership insisted on Latin as the official language of Scripture
 - Translating the Bible into other languages became a criminal act
 - Case was made that errors would creep into those versions
 - (Yet not anymore than the Bible being put into Latin!)

The Bible in English



- **995** Anglo-Saxons translate the New Testament into Old English
- **1384** John Wycliffe produces a handwritten translation of the Bible (OT & NT)






ROAD TO CANOSSA

 - Called Christianity a “profitable fable”







Why was this so controversial?



- **Words have meanings**

- Thomas More challenged the translation of the word, *presbyter*, which Tyndale correctly called “elder”
 - More was incensed that Tyndale did not use the word “priest” instead. If Tyndale was right, the formal office of priest does not explicitly exist in the New Testament
- The word for *agape*, translated “charity,” had financial implications. Tyndale used “love”
 - If Tyndale was right and the word was “love,” then I Cor. 13 indicates our highest duty is to love others rather than give gifts of charity to the Catholic church.





- Tyndale used the word “repentance” instead of “penance”

What is the Bible Worth to You?



- **Sacrifices have been made to share truth**
 - Elijah *hid* at a brook and later at a widow's house
 - Prophets were *hid* 50 to a cave (1 Kgs. 18:4)
 - Micaiah – *shut up in a prison* (1 Kgs. 22:26-27)
 - Jeremiah *put in a pit* in a dungeon (Jer. 38:6)
 - John on Patmos – for the testimony (Rev. 1:9)
 - Souls below the altar – for the testimony (Rev. 6:9-11)
 - Jesus killed on a cross (Jn. 18:37)

 - It's hard to say you would if you do not study it, meditate upon it, live by it and share it with others
- **Do you read the Bible daily?**
 - Acts 17:11; 2 Tim. 2:15
